Garbage Collection Reminders

The township reminds all residents of the following garbage collection regulations as described in Chapter 20, Section 104.3 of the Moon Township Code of Ordinances:

- Bags or containers of garbage should not be set at curbside by residents more than 12 hours prior to their expected collection time by the contractor.
- All municipal waste shall be drained free of liquids before being placed in approved containers.
- All garbage or other putrescible waste shall be securely wrapped in paper, plastic or similar material or placed in properly tied plastic bags.
- Food containers should be rinsed free of food particles and drained before being placed in approved containers.
- Garden clippings and tree trimmings shall be placed in approved containers or shall be cut and tied securely into bundles. Bundles shall be not more than four feet in length, not more than two feet in diameter and not more than 40 pounds in weight.

Electronics Recycling Day

Saturday, October 7

10:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m.

Moon Township's Environmental Advisory Council, in partnership with JVS Environmental, hosts quarterly electronics collections to gather unused and unwanted electronic items. These events collect electronic items only, including printers, copiers, computers, laptops and televisions. Only one television per vehicle will be accepted. Electronics collections are open to Moon Township residents only. Proper ID is required.

The EAC held Moon's Annual Recycling Day on Saturday, June 3. A total of 978 cars came through this year's collection to help keep materials out of landfills. The EAC collected a total of 237 appliances, 594 tires, two large box trucks full of usable construction materials, and several large box trucks full of electronics. Thanks again to all the volunteers and community members who donated their time and effort to help make it all possible!

Daylight Saving Time Ends

Sunday, November 5

Daylight Saving Time ends at 2:00 a.m. on Sunday, November 5. Don't forget to turn your clocks back one hour. In case you didn't know, historians credit Benjamin Franklin with the idea to reset clocks in the summer months as a way to conserve energy. However, Daylight Saving Time didn't officially begin until more than a century later in 1916 when Germany established it as a way to conserve fuel during World War I. The rest of Europe came on board shortly thereafter, with the United States adopting it in 1918. DST resurfaced during WWII but wasn't consistently deployed throughout the states until Congress enacted the Uniform Time Act in 1966.



Swimming Pool Water Discharge Guidelines

Water from swimming pools and hot tubs often contains high levels of chlorine. Discharging chlorinated pool or spa water into streams, (irrigation canals or ponds, etc.) is harmful to fish and other aquatic life. The discharge of any sewage or industrial waste, including swimming pool water, to any waters of the commonwealth without a permit is a violation of the Clean Streams Law, the Act of June 22, 1937, P.L. 1987, as amended.

The Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) does not require a permit for discharges from single residence pools, provided the guidelines outlined below are followed. Moon Township should be contacted concerning its local ordinances, such as stormwater ordinance §23-131.

These guidelines cannot be construed to waive or impair any rights of DEP to prosecute a property (pool) owner and/or pool company for any stream damage that occurs as a result of a discharge. Penalties would be assessed under the provisions of the Clean Streams Law.

Pool Guidelines:

A. Disposal of Water to Sanitary Sewer

1. If the municipal authority grants permission, pool backwash water, pool cleaning wastewater and standing water may be discharged to the sanitary sewer system. Neutralize water before discharge by following these steps:

a) Prior to disposal of pool water to a sanitary sewer, shut off the chlorination system if there is one, or stop adding chlorine.

b) Hold the water in the pool or hot tub for at least two weeks to allow the chlorine to dissipate.

c) Measure the chlorine level in the pool or hot tub prior to discharging the water. The water should not show any detectable levels of chlorine. A longer holding period may be necessary if chlorine levels continue to remain at detectable levels at the end of two weeks. Chlorine measurements can be made with a chlorine test kit (colorimetric).

2. Plan discharge for low-use times of sewer flow such as afternoon or late night hours.

3. Use small volume pump and control

discharge so it does not spill out. (less than 10 gallons per minute)

4. Discharge with hose into access "cap" of the private property sewer cleanout. DO NOT use public manholes or cleanouts.

5. Care should be taken to make sure the discharge goes into a sanitary sewer **and not a storm sewer, which would discharge to a stream**. If sanitary sewers are not in the immediate area, the wastewater should be hauled off-site for disposal at an approved treatment facility.

6. Water from backwashing pool filters should not be discharged to a stream, ditch or storm sewer. Backwash from pool filters must be discharged to the sanitary sewer, on-site septic tank and drainfield system (if properly designed and adequately sized), or a seepage pit.

B. Discharge of Water

1. If the discharge to sanitary sewer is not feasible, then the following guidelines must be followed before discharging the water:

a) Prior to disposing or using the water for irrigation, shut off the chlorination system if there is one, or stop adding chlorine.

b) Hold the water in the pool or hot tub for two weeks to reduce the chlorine level.

c) Discharge or use the water for irrigation in an area where the water will not flow into a stream or storm sewer.

d) Discharge or use the water for irrigating the property and ensure that it does not flow off the property.

e) Discharge or use the water for irrigation in a manner that will prevent nuisance conditions (such as creation of odors, and fly and mosquito breeding conditions). Nuisance conditions occur when water is held in the pool for a prolonged period.

2. The discharge should be at a rate which prevents erosion and optimizes filtration.

In no event should pool water be directly discharged to waters of the commonwealth.

C. Pump Standing water

Standing water or accumulated rain and/or pool water from the previous season should be pumped from the top so as not to disturb settled solids. Solids on the pool bottom

should not be discharged. After the water has been pumped, solids should be cleaned out manually. The discharge should not raise stream temperatures by more than two degrees Fahrenheit in a one-hour period or a total of five degrees Fahrenheit. The pH should be between six and nine standard units and total chlorine residual should be 0.0 mg/l.

D. Clean Waste Waters

Cleaning wastewaters that contain muriatic acid or chlorine that is used in cleaning pool surfaces should be treated prior to discharge. Muriatic acid wastewater should be neutralized to a pH between six and nine standard units. Chlorine rinses should stand for a period of 10 days to allow chlorine degradation prior to discharge. Total chlorine residual of the wastewater discharge should be less than 0.5 mg/l. Temperature should be monitored as described above (standing water). Chlorine rinse water pH should be between six and nine standard units.

10 Tips to Prevent Stormwater Runoff

1. Use fertilizers sparingly and sweep up driveways, sidewalks and roads.
2. Never dump anything down storm drains.
3. Vegetate bare spots in your yard.
4. Compost your yard waste.
5. Avoid pesticides; learn about Integrated Pest Management (IPM).
6. Direct downspouts away from paved surfaces.
7. Take your car to the car wash instead of washing it in the driveway.
8. Check your car for leaks and recycle motor oil.
9. Pick up after your pet.
10. Have your septic tank pumped and system inspected regularly.

Officers Practice Real-World Situations with Simulated Firearms Training

Moon Township police officers participated in a virtual reality training program recently. The simulated firearms system allowed officers to practice the Use of Force Continuum, which is a standard that provides law enforcement officers with guidelines as to how much force may be used against a resisting subject in a given situation.

Officers were presented with several real-world scenarios they may encounter where use of force may be necessary, such as traffic stops, domestic disputes and patrol situations. The system operator manipulated the scenarios based on the officers' decisions.

Firearms and Critical Incident Response Team (CIRT) instructors monitored each officer's performance and conducted a debriefing immediately afterward to discuss what the officer did right or what could have been done differently to resolve the scenario in the best possible way to have the most positive outcome.

"When we train and qualify with our firearms and other less-than-lethal tools, we practice tactics and proficiency," said Moon Township Police Captain Greg Seamon. "The simulator training allows officers to practice reacting to different high-stress situations that they may encounter in their everyday, real-world duties. They practice resolving scenarios by trying to de-escalate the situation, using non-lethal or less-than-lethal force, or using lethal force depending on the circumstances presented in the scenario. This translates into better decision making by the officers when faced with similar situations while on duty."

Halloween Safety Tips for Parents

Halloween is a festive and fun time of the year for kids, but it can be a little tricky for parents. Here are some safety tips to be sure it's a treat for everyone.

Evaluate Costume Hazards

- Make sure your child's costume fits properly and that he/she can see clearly.
- Apply makeup instead of having your child wear a mask. Masks can be hot and uncomfortable, and they can obstruct a child's vision.
- Keep costumes short to prevent trips, falls and other bumps in the night.
- Be sure the costume is visible at night. If a costume is dark in color, add some reflective tape on the front and back.
- Purchase a costume that is flame retardant. Burning jack-o-lanterns can be dangerous.

Trick-or-Treat with Caution

- Arrange for an adult or responsible teenager to accompany younger children.
- Map out a route in advance. If you're not accompanying older children, you'll know where to find them.
- Make sure you know which friends are

trick-or-treating with your children.

- Never approach an unlit house, or enter a house of people you don't know very well.
- Carry a flashlight.
- Be aware of traffic. Use sidewalks when possible. If there are no sidewalks, walk on the left side of the street facing oncoming traffic.
- Do not accept rides from anyone but a family member.
- Avoid animals and pets which may become upset by masks and costumes.

Ensure a Safe Bounty

- Instruct all trick-or-treaters not to sample treats until they are home and the treats have been examined by an adult.
- Inspect treats at home in a well-lit area.
- Throw away anything opened, partially unwrapped or not in its original wrapper.
- Carefully check all wrappers for signs of tampering.
- Inspect homemade goodies for anything suspicious.
- Call the police if you find any suspicious treats.

Sign Up for Emergency Alerts

Moon Township police encourage everyone who lives, works and plays in Moon Township to sign up for SwiftReach to receive emergency alerts and community notifications on their cell phones. All listed landline phone numbers have already been programmed into the system, but since many people no longer have a home phone or primarily use their mobile devices, residents are encouraged to register their cell phone number with SwiftReach. Subscribers can also sign up to receive text messages and/or emails. Registration is free and all alerts will be clearly identified as originating from Moon Township officials. Fire Prevention Week

October 8 - 14

According to the National Archives and Records Administration's Library Information Center, Fire Prevention Week is the longest running public health observance. President Calvin Coolidge proclaimed the first National Fire Prevention Week on October 4-10, 1925. It is observed on the Sunday through Saturday period in which October 9 falls, in commemoration of the Great Chicago Fire, which began October 8, 1871, and did most of its damage October 9. The horrific fire killed more than 250 people, left 100,000 homeless, destroyed more than 17,400 structures and burned more than 2,000 acres.

Fire Prevention Week serves as a yearly reminder to review home fire safety preparedness. As the official sponsor of Fire Prevention Week, The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) promotes a different theme each year. For 2017, the theme is "Every Second Counts: Plan 2 Ways Out!" Seconds can make a huge difference when escaping a fire. That's why everyone should have an escape plan. Here's what the NFPA recommends:

- Draw a map of your home with all members of your household, marking two exits from each room and a path to the outside from each exit.
- Practice a home fire drill twice a year. Conduct one at night and one during the day with everyone in your home, and practice using different ways out.
- Teach children how to escape on their own in case you can't help them.
- Make sure your house number is clearly marked and easy for the fire department to find.
- Close doors behind you as you leave as this may slow the spread of smoke, heat and fire.
- Once you get outside, stay outside. Never go back inside a burning building.

Fall Yard Waste Collection

As residents clean up their yards before winter, the township's Public Works department provides the following services to assist residents with this task.

Compost Dropoff

Saturdays & Sundays
October 28 – December 10
9 a.m. – 5 p.m.
Downes Fire Station

Residents may drop off yard waste to be composted, including tree limbs, leaves, and plant matter. Tree limbs should not exceed six feet in length and four inches in diameter, and should not be bundled or tied. The Downes Fire Station, located at the intersection of Beaver Grade Road and Ewing Road, will accept yard waste between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. on Saturdays and Sundays. Residents dropping off waste or picking up compost or wood chips outside of these hours are asked to notify Public Works by calling 412.262.1700.

Curbside Leaf Pickup

Monday – Friday
October 30 – December 1

The schedule follows residents' regular garbage collection. Simply place leaves at the curb by 8 a.m. on pickup day. Residents are reminded to put leaves in biodegradable paper bags. Loose leaves and leaves in plastic bags or boxes will not be picked up.

Curbside Tree Branch Pickup

Monday – Friday
October 30 – December 1

This program follows the resident's garbage pickup schedule. Please place branches at the curb no later than 8 a.m. on pickup day. Tree branches should not exceed six feet in length and four inches in diameter and should not be bundled or tied.

As a reminder, there will be no curbside pickups on Veterans Day, Thanksgiving Day and the day after Thanksgiving.

Miracle League Coming to Moon Park

Moon Park will soon be home to a Miracle League baseball field, which will provide individuals with special needs the opportunity to play America's pastime in a safe environment.

The Miracle League removes the barriers that cause children and adults with mental and physical disabilities to be excluded from conventional baseball leagues. Miracle League teams play on a custom-designed, rubberized turf field that accommodates wheelchairs and other assistive devices while helping to prevent injuries.

But for the athletes, it's more than playing a game. The Miracle League is about making new friends, building self-esteem and being treated just like other athletes. The league uses a "buddy" system which pairs each player with an able-bodied peer, resulting in an indescribable bond.

Luke Magulick is the inspiration for the field. The son of Mike and Christina Magulick of Moon, Luke has a genetic disorder known as 5P- Syndrome. The Magulick's, along with family and friends, formed The Miracle League of Moon Township, a 501c3 nonprofit, to begin raising funds for the project. They've received approval from the Miracle

League national organization and have partnered with Pirates Charities.

The field in Moon will be a first for Pittsburgh's western suburbs. Other Miracle Fields in the Pittsburgh area include Cranberry Township, Upper St. Clair and Murrysville. In addition to the field, facilities will include a 9,500-square-foot adaptive playground with a moon theme. The adaptive playground will allow kids with and without disabilities to play in the same areas of the playground. Pavilion seating and restrooms will provide a completely inclusive campus for families to enjoy.

Community Service Blooms at Fleur de Lune Garden at Robin Hill

The new garden at Robin Hill is called "Fleur de Lune" which translates as Flower of the Moon. Located on the north side of the park, the garden features native species landscaping with improved sustainability and accessibility. The design includes an herb garden, a hillside rock garden, a large pergola, benches, raised stone beds, a potting barn and sculptures. Visitors will also enjoy a sensory garden with olfactory, visual, auditory, tactile and even gustatory (tasting) stimuli. The previous site on the south side of the property will be repurposed into a natural area featuring a wild flower meadow and bee sanctuary that links to the Black Cherry Spur Trail.

The new garden is a total community project coordinated by the township's Community Engagement department. Students from ITT Technical Institute collaborated with Moon Garden Club President Ellen Northy and fellow Garden Club member Merrienne Cacali to create the final plan. Moon Township public works staff designed and built stone garden beds. Friends and family of the late Patricia Stilwell donated a large pergola, weeping cherry trees and benches in her honor. Eagle Scout Aaron Tilton, a Moon Area High School student, developed the hillside rock garden, and the West Hills Art League plans to integrate art features. To honor the old herb garden's historical past, Moon Historical Society President Earl Edwards is creating an interpretive sign with four panels depicting the history of the garden's use over time. Edwards, also designed four other interpretive historical signs located throughout the township.

A grand opening event is planned for Fall 2017. Look for details on the Moon Township Garden Club website at moontownshipgardenclub.com.

Sponsor the NEW Moon Park Playground

Moon Township is seeking community and corporate sponsors to partner with in building a new playground at Moon Park. The area will undergo a total overhaul, with a design that incorporates the area's topography. The plan calls for replacement of all existing equipment with new features including natural and adventure play areas, a 2- to 5-year-old play area, a 5- to 12-year-old play area, a splash pad, an obstacle course, and an adult exercise area all joined by an ADA accessible pathway.

The township secured a \$250,000 grant from the PA Department of Conservation and Natural Resources to rebuild the Moon Park playground, and the Board of Supervisors budgeted a matching \$250,000 for the project.

These funds will be used to build a majority of the playground, however additional funds are needed to complete this new park feature.

Opportunities exist to sponsor each recreation area, as well as amenities such as benches, a donor wall, landscaping and more. Tax Information

Township of Moon Property Tax

The Moon Township property tax office finalized the FACE period for the Township of Moon property tax collection period on July 31, 2017. We are now collecting the 10% penalty amount which runs from August 1 to December 31, 2017. Any Township of Moon property taxes that remain outstanding after December 31 will be turned over to the delinquent tax collector as appointed by the Township of Moon.

Moon Area School District Property Tax

The Moon Area School District property tax discount period runs from July 1 to August 31, 2017. If you choose to pay installments, the first installment must have been received by my office no later than August 31. All taxpayers paying installments receive a sheet with the remaining three coupons for September, October and November reflecting the face value. Installments are not eligible for the discount, nor are they able to be paid through the tax office website.

Helpful Reminders

- Regardless of school or property tax, if the mortgage company on record did not submit a payment by the end of the discount period, my office will send a duplicate statement to the last property owner at the address we have on file. Typically, all mortgage and escrow companies pay the discount amount. However, if the mortgage was paid off or refinanced with a new company, the only notification my office receives is from the property owner directly. Please contact my office with this updated information so we have the correct address on file for your tax statements.

- Once my office turns over any outstanding taxes to the appointed delinquent collector by the taxing authority, regardless if it's the municipality or the school district, I have no authority to handle these payments. I can answer general questions about the outstanding parcel but have no up-to-date information. The taxpayer must contact the agency that is listed on the notice they receive. If I can assist in any other way, please don't hesitate to contact my office.

- The tax office hours are listed at the bottom of your tax statement,

whether it's the Township of Moon or Moon Area School District property tax. You can also locate the office hours, including holiday closings at moontaxoffice.us. During busy tax collection periods, my office is open late on Thursdays from 1 p.m. to 7 p.m. and on Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m. Always check the bottom of your tax statement for days of the week and times the tax office is open.
