

And as we move into Fall, don't forget we have a few weeks left for the farmers' market. Lastly, I'd like to call to your attention that the trash/recycling disposal contract was up for bid in July. The Moon Township Municipal Authority manages these services for Moon Township, working in partnership with the South Hills Area Council of Governments to negotiate the best price. MTMA awarded the contract to Waste Management. Even though our provider will be the same, there will be some small changes to service as well as what is included in recycling. Most notably, ALL GLASS is no longer recyclable, and plastics

are limited to those containers numbered with a 1 or a 2. Also, a clean cardboard box is recyclable, while a cardboard pizza box or fast food container soiled with grease or food residue is not. These changes will take effect in January, so keep an eye out for additional communications.

I hope you enjoyed a fantastic summer and that you'll join us for the upcoming Fall events. Your support and participation are two of the things that makes Moon a thriving community and why people and businesses alike continue to "Make it Moon!"

Electronics Recycling Day

Moon Township's Environmental Advisory Council (EAC), in partnership with JVS Environmental, hosts quarterly electronics collections to gather unused and unwanted electronic items. These events collect electronic items only, including printers, copiers, computers, laptops and televisions. Only one television per vehicle will be accepted. Electronics collections are open to Moon Township residents only. Proper ID is required. For more information, please call **412.262.1700** ext. **110**.

A total of 805 cars came through the EAC's annual recycling day in June. Volunteers collected four semi-truckloads of electronics, including a total of 173 appliances (77 which contained FREON) and 474 tires, as well as other donations for the Center for Creative Re-use, usable home healthcare supplies for Global Links and an overflow of construction materials for Construction Junction. Happy Trails to You!

It is primarily through the efforts of volunteers that trails are cleared and maintained in Moon Township. Thanks to generous trails sponsors – Chevron, AMROCK and Columbia Sportswear – for their volunteers, stewardship and financial support, and thanks to Hollow Oak Land Trust for providing a range of excellent trail services in the process. Here's what they've been up to this season:

Olson Park

Look for the new Silver Trail on the upper hillside (west) to be open soon. Moon Township and Hollow Oak designed the trail, while volunteers from AMROCK Corporation helped build it. Signs will be in place soon.

Robin Hill Park

Moon Township and Hollow Oak are putting the final touches on a plan to add a trail system to the new 90 acres being added to the park. Volunteers from Chevron and Robert Morris University have already signed up to help build the trails, but more volunteers are needed through the fall and early winter. This expansion will offer over four miles of new trail and connect to several neighborhoods in the Robin Hill area.

Moon Park

Earlier this summer, over 30 volunteers from Columbia Sportswear and Dick's Sporting Goods worked to enhance the gravel trail at Nelson Pond. They also added mulch and plantings. We are thankful to Columbia Sportswear for their generous donation of a new map message board and benches.

Within the next year, nearly 10 miles of maintained trails in our parks will connect to the conservation areas owned and maintained by Hollow Oak Land Trust, plus other greenspaces as well. Hollow Oak secured over \$350,000 in funds and services to construct five trail bridges linking the Montour Trail in Robinson Township to Moon Township Park through the Montour Woods Conservation Area. Moon Township has donated the bridge permitting, with construction starting in 2018 and completion expected in 2019. The bridges will allow hikers and bikers to branch off the Montour Trail and follow woodland trails to Moon Park and eventually the Moon Golf Club.

Maps showing the new trails are available online at **moonparks.org**. Or pick up printed maps at Robin Hill, the Moon Parks and Recreation office and the Municipal Building. Maps are also featured in all park message boards.

Return to Meadows and No Mow Zones to Support Wildlife

Many species depend on grasslands for food, cover and breeding, but grassland habitats have steadily declined across the country. One way to fix this problem is to create areas where mowing is restricted. In a low mow zone, grass is mowed one to two times a year which allows native plants and grasses to grow. In a no mow zone, the area is allowed to progress through succession to return to a natural state. Succession is a process that takes many years, but eventually a forest will return to the area.

The benefits of reducing or eliminating mowing are numerous for a community. It provides food, shelter, and breeding ground for a variety of wildlife and critical habitat, especially for pollinators such as native bumble bees. It also significantly decreases the amount of time, labor, fertilizer, water and gas used during mowing. Did you know that running a mower for one hour emits the same amount of pollutants as driving 100 miles? In addition, native grasses and plants with longer roots than typical turf grass stabilize soil which reduces erosion and slows stormwater runoff.

Moon Township Public Works and the Community Development and Community Engagement departments have identified several no mow zones throughout our parks and open space areas. Look for new interpretive signage and enjoy the grasses, plants, native wildflowers and, of course, birds and bees! Plans are in the works for a full wildflower meadow trail in 2019.

Robin Hill Native Species Nursery



- Hold a flashlight to help you see and others to see you.


Always test make-up in a small area first. Remove it before bedtime to prevent possible skin and eye irritation.

National Prescription Drug Take Back Day

Saturday, October 27

The National Prescription Drug Take Back Day aims to provide a safe, convenient, and responsible means of disposing of prescription drugs, while also educating the public about the potential for abuse of medications.

The program addresses a crucial public safety and public health issue and provides an opportunity for Americans to prevent drug addiction and overdose deaths. According to the 2015 National Survey on Drug Use and Health, 6.4 million Americans abused controlled prescription drugs. The study shows that a majority of abused prescription drugs were obtained from family and friends, often from the home medicine cabinet.

Moon Township residents may drop off unwanted and expired prescription drugs year-round in the collection box located in the police station lobby at 1000 Beaver Grade Road.

Sign Up for Emergency Alerts

Moon Township police encourage everyone who lives, works and plays in Moon Township to sign up for SwiftReach to receive emergency alerts and community notifications on their cell phones. All listed landline phone numbers have already been programmed into the system, but since many people no longer have a home phone or primarily use their mobile devices, residents are encouraged to register their cell phone number with SwiftReach. Subscribers can also sign up to receive text messages and/or emails.

Registration is free and all alerts will be clearly identified as originating from Moon Township officials. Visit **moontwp. com** or **moonpolice.us** and look for the SwiftReach link on the home page.

Fire Prevention Week

October 7-13

According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), U.S. fire departments responded to more than 352,000 home structure fires, which includes one- and two-family homes and apartments. These fires caused 2,735 deaths and 10,750 injuries.

NFPA is the official sponsor of Fire Prevention Week, which serves as a yearly reminder to review home fire safety preparedness. This year's theme is "Look. Listen. Learn. Be aware. Fire can happen anywhere." It aims to educate about three basic but essential steps to take to reduce the likelihood of having a fire — and how to escape safely in the event of one:

"LOOK" for places fire could start. Take a good look around your home. Identify potential fire hazards and take care of them.

"LISTEN" for the sound of the smoke alarm. You could have only minutes to escape safely once the smoke alarm sounds. Go to your outside meeting place, which should be a safe distance from the home and where everyone should meet.

"LEARN" two ways out of every room and make sure all doors and windows leading outside open easily and are free of clutter.

The program provides an annual real estate property tax credit of 20 percent to each certified, active volunteer who meets the specified requirements. Public Works Crews Keep Moon Beautiful, Many Projects at a Time

Summer is the season when many public works projects are done throughout our community. In addition to regular facility maintenance and grounds keeping, the Public Works Department is working hard around the township.

Among the more noticeable projects is the work at Moon Park. Crews completed the new sand volleyball court earlier this year. They dismantled all the existing play equipment, relocating some to other areas of the park, and began work on the relocation of the roadway to flow behind the Rotary pavilion as well as a new parking lot. They also are working to improve the existing water line to accommodate the splash pad, making it a looped system with no dead ends. This improves water quality by reducing the likelihood of bacteria resulting from stagnant water.

If you live or travel on any of the roads scheduled for resurfacing, you've probably seen crews preparing the roads for new pavement. The rainy spring season wasn't kind to our roads this year, so crews have been patching potholes on other roads around the township. They also dealt with a few mud slides as a result of the weather.

The Carnot fire station received some updates with a new floor coating, roof repair, paint and the addition of new glass block windows. Whispering Woods baseball field received new fencing. Crews installed new sidewalks in Mooncrest and repaired the walkway at Robin Hill Park. They also installed new community signs at Wessex Hills and Mooncrest. Finally, Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) retention ponds were maintained to stay in compliance with federal and state regulations.

If you happen to see one of the public works trucks out and about, be sure to thank them for keeping Moon Township beautiful!

Fall Yard Waste Collection

Moon Township's Public Works Department offers the following services to assist residents with fall yard waste disposal:

Compost Dropoff
Saturdays & Sundays
October 27 – December 9
9 a.m. – 5 p.m.
Downes Fire Station

The township's composting program provides free mulch and compost to Moon Township residents. Bring your own containers and take as much as you need. Residents may drop off yard waste to be composted, including tree limbs, leaves, and plant matter. Tree limbs should not exceed six feet in length and four inches in diameter and should not be bundled or tied. No trash or other materials will be accepted. Residents may drop off vard waste or pick up mulch or compost at the Downes Fire Station, located at the intersection of Beaver Grade Road and Ewing Road, between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. on Saturdays and Sundays. Outside of these hours, please notify Public Works before arriving by calling 412.262.1700.

Curbside Leaf Pickup Monday – Friday October 29 – November 30

The schedule follows residents' regular garbage collection. Place leaves at the curb by 8 a.m. on pickup day. Residents are reminded to put leaves in biodegradable paper bags. Loose leaves and leaves in plastic bags or boxes will not be picked up.

Curbside Tree Branch Pickup Monday – Friday October 29 – November 30

The schedule follows residents' regular garbage collection. Place branches at the curb no later than 8 a.m. on pickup day. Tree branches should not exceed six feet in length and four inches in diameter and should not be bundled or tied.

As a reminder, there will be no curbside pickups on Veterans Day (observed 11/12/18), Thanksgiving Day and the day after Thanksgiving. And please note that the curbside leaf and tree branch pickups are handled with two separate trucks.

Construction Begins on Moon Park's New Playground

Moon Parks and Recreation hosted a groundbreaking event for the new Moon Park playground in July. Township supervisors and staff as well as representatives from the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board, the Pennsylvania Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR), the Allegheny County Council and the design firm HRG participated in the official turning of the soil.

The Public Works crew removed the remaining play equipment from the site, relocating some to other areas of the park. Next, they'll prepare the water line for the splash pad, which includes modifying the line to a looped system that allows for better water flow and prevents stagnant water from remaining in the pipes. Construction will continue for several months. The grand opening will take place sometime in spring 2019.

While grants from the DCNR and the Allegheny County Redevelopment Authority's Gaming Economic Development Fund helped fund the playground, the township is offering several opportunities for corporations and individuals to get involved. 2018 Township of Moon Property Taxes

We are now collecting the 10% Penalty amount until the end of this calendar year for the Township of Moon Property taxes. Please remember, according to Pennsylvania state law, the property owner is responsible for the property tax regardless of whether or not a statement was received.

2018 Moon Area School District Property Taxes

Moon Area School District property tax statements were mailed by July 1, 2018. We are now collecting the face amount until October 31, 2018.

Property owners who chose the option to pay four installments, must have paid the first installment no later than August 31. Coupons for the remaining three installments (due 9/30, 10/31 and 11/30) have been mailed to property owners. Please note that random amounts for installments will not be accepted. If you wish to accelerate your payments, the only option is to double the amount.

Postmarked mail is always accepted, but please remember that it must show the post mark on the envelope. If you wish to receive a paid receipt, whether it's the individual installment payments or the final summary of all payments, please send a self-addressed stamped envelope. The cost of printing, postage and envelopes prohibits my office from sending these as a courtesy and not all taxpayers request receipts.

How to Make Payments

Property owners may make payments in the following ways:

1. Online at moontaxoffice.us. When paying online, you must click the word "verify" after filling out your property's block/lot located in the upper left-hand corner of your statement. You cannot change the amount for the period we are currently collecting.

Please note that installment payments cannot be made online nor can non-real estate per capita taxes sent to renters only.

- 2. In person at the property tax office. Office hours are listed at the bottom of your property tax statement. Be sure to check the office website for holiday closings and other useful information.
- 3. By mailing your payment and statement to the address above. If you would like a stamped receipt, please include both copies of the statement along with a self-addressed stamped envelope.

Change of Address/ Change of Name
